

What is social procurement?

- Leveraging purchasing policies to achieve blended value by attaining economic and social objectives
- Promoting sustainability by prioritizing the longterm value of purchasing decisions
- Enabling access to your community's supply chain for diverse suppliers
- Maximizing the value of public funds

What are anchor institutions?

- Organizations with considerable purchasing power that are physically woven into a community
- Organizations that can intentionally use their resources to help build strong and vibrant communities

Social Procurement benefits both the community and your institution, and it's easy to implement.

What can you do?



Establish benchmarks and policies: Implement goals and official policies with a commitment to social procurement while committing to long-term value of purchasing decisions



Capture purchasing data: Establish a framework to capture social purchasing that you may already be doing



Promote through messaging: Position yourself as leaders in this space, promoting local inclusion and influencing other place-based institutions (e.g., governments, hospitals)
